

Introduction of Speaker Dr. Nicholas Bellantoni

John H. Jameson is senior archaeologist and Program Lead, Technical Assistance and Partnerships, for the Southeast Archaeological Center, U.S. National Park Service (NPS). His 25-plus years of public service have encompassed a broad range of projects in cultural heritage preservation and cultural resource management in several regions of the United States and overseas. At NPS, John has led important initiatives in public interpretation, education, and outreach. His career highlights include:

- Beginning in the 1990's he managed the Center's Public Interpretation Initiative, a long-term outreach program, international in scope, that involved numerous government-sponsored symposia, training workshops, seminars, exhibits planning and development, website development, and publications on the topic of public education and interpretation of cultural heritage.
- A recognized national leader in public archaeology programs, he is a key player
 in the organization and development of training courses for park rangers and
 cultural resource specialists in the effective interpretation of archaeological and
 cultural heritage resources.
- As Curriculum Coordinator and Interpretive Development Program (IDP) Certifier, he evaluates professional interpretation and education programs in the NPS.
- He organized and coordinated an interdisciplinary Task Group in developing the interdisciplinary Archaeology Interpretation Training Module (NPS IDP Module 440).
- In November 2005 he received the coveted Sequoia Award from the NPS for significant, long-term contributions to interpretation, education, and partnerships.
- In recent years he has served as Vice President, Interpretation Methods and Policy, for the International Committee on Interpretation and Presentation (ICIP) of ICOMOS.
- He has served as member and chair of numerous professional society committees.
- He is a prolific writer, having edited and contributed to publisher and has been a keynote and plenary speaker at numerous international conferences.
